From working up on 40 meters high process towers to coordinating Emergency Teams during emergencies at the gas plant and mentoring the young local personnel, I can say that I cannot find two similar days during the three years of the assignment. One of the critical moments was when we responded to a massive H₂S leak lasting more than 2 hours in one of the plant areas with the highest concentration of H₂S gas. This was handled safely and professionally thanks to a well-prepared team and operations.

After a long day at the plant, I remember coming back to the Staff House, where I prepared a purely Italian style dinner for my colleagues, and I had the feeling that it was really enjoyed. That was a good feeling.
